The Power of Language



I used to tell people, "I'm a worrier." It took me a while to realize by saying those words I was claiming that identity over myself. A worrier. Anxious. I gave myself permission to have anxiety. I decided that day, I was not going to call myself a worrier anymore. Do you know what happened? I stopped worrying. Now, there are definitely still anxious moments, but my needless worries over trivial things have dissipated. It has been replaced by this crazy notion that God will take care of us, and he has.

Reprogramming your thoughts by altering your language is not a new concept, so I created the "I can't" jar here at Hope Lives. Every time a student says the words "I can't" without at least trying, they owe me 10 cents. (The money gets added to

our horse treat fund.) The first time an "I can't" rears its head, we talk about the power of our words with the student. I tell them it is always good to ask for help or say that something is hard, but it is not okay to give up before you try.

I had a little girl in the program the last few years who was a frequent patron of the "I can't" jar her first year, but I have not had to charge her a penny since. She comes out to the ranch and tries everything I ask at least once. She says "this is hard!" and "can you help?" and she is a lot braver than before.

I taught a little boy this summer who just needed an explanation of what the "I can't" jar is, and immediately he corrected his language. It was amazing. He looked at me and said, "I c- I need some help." I could not have been more proud of him. The more we can empower their words, the more we can empower our students. They are passionate, powerful people. I love watching them discover it.

We had everyone praying, and by the time 1:00 p.m. rolled around, we had blue skies and puffy white clouds. Thank you, Jesus!
